
Opportunity Scholarship Program Public School Option

The Opportunity Scholarship Program (OSP) provides parents an opportunity to choose a higher-performing public school if their children attended a school the year in which it received a grade of "F" or received its third consecutive "D". Students who are assigned to attend such a school in the upcoming school year are also eligible to choose a higher-performing public school. The 2011 Legislature amended the OSP to expand parental options for public school choice to include any higher-performing public school in the state that has space available and to allow a student participating in OSP to continue attending in the higher-performing public school feeder pattern until the student graduates from high school.



A total of 3,649 students were enrolled in the public option of the OSP for the 2012-13 school year. Of those students, 61% were in grades 9-12. African-American students were among the largest population to participate at 63%, followed by White students at 18% and Hispanic students at 15%.
