### Palm Bay Charter School Recommended for Accreditation



is giving high marks to Palm Bay Community Charter School and Municipal Charter High School for being in compliance with some of the toughest research-based quality standards in education. The assessment team will recommend the school for accreditation through the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement (SACS CASI).

A team of professional evaluators

Five members of the Quality Assurance Review Team (QAR) representing SACS CASI spent three days pouring over the school's policies and procedures, interviewing personnel and evaluating the overall workings of the school to determine if it met the high standards for accreditation. Following its review, the QAR Team reports it will make an accreditation recommendation that will be reviewed at the state level and by the national AdvancED Accreditation Commission which meets in July to make the final decision. "We are very pleased with the evaluation and the recommendation," said Principal David Calvo. "This really speaks volumes to the continuous improvement process that exists in the school."

The recommendation means Palm Bay Community Charter and Municipal Charter High School is in compliance with a set of strict standards set by the commission governing everything from the school's vision and purpose to its teaching and learning practices. documented and measured effectiveness, communication with stakeholders, resources and support systems, and the school's overall governance and leadership. These standards are determined by experts to be a set of rigorous protocols that determine the school's ability to effectively drive student performance and make continuous improvements in their education and learning.

The process began in 2009 with the initial application for accreditation. Since that time field consultants visited the school and reviewed every aspect of its operations, including the type of text-books being used, how they were used, the curriculum and how it was implemented, teacher training and certification, community involvement, student performance

and every aspect of the educational practices being delivered. "It was a grueling process, but validated that we are providing quality education to our students," Calvo added. The recommendation means Palm Bay is the only charter school to be recommended for accreditation in Brevard County.

Palm Bay Community Charter School first opened in 2006, serving students in grades K-7. It has since grown to serve 826 students in grades PreK-10 and continues to add a grade each year. The school is managed by Academica Corporation, one of Florida's longest serving and most successful charter school management organizations

Change we can believe, change we must achieve. That is the theme Inlet Grove Community High School student Jasmin Farrington had to get across when she decided to enter the Martin Luther King Jr. Coordinating Committee's essay contest to honor the fallen leader.

She tried to make a difference, as did Dr. King, by taking a look at his achievements from a different perspective... the perspective of a 16-year-old who was not yet born. "I researched some of Dr. King's speeches and, of course, asked my mom," said Farrington. "I looked at some of the effects of his work, such as our current president is the first black man to hold that position

in the United States of America, and his platform is also change, all these years later. We do have a Supreme Court justice and others in high places in our government, so we have taken steps forward."

Farrington said her debate coach, Ms. Martens, encouraged her to enter the contest, and since she is known among her classmates as a good writer, they unanimously chose her to be their voices. Farrington said the messages of the past are still relevant today. The junior, who aspires to become a pediatric dentist, said there have been many advances over the years since that fateful day when Dr. Martin Luther King was assassinated. "As far

as my friends and I, right here and now, our priority is to stop bullying on school campuses. We keep a lookout during school and if we see something, we report it," she said. "That is a change that we think is very important in today's society." Farrington tied for first place and received a certificate and a monetary award.

### Local Teacher Selected to Set Sail on Research Vessel

Palm Beach Maritime Academy teacher Steve Allen has been selected to sail with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) *Teacher at Sea* program. Just one of only thirty teachers selected to participate, Mr. Allen – a 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade Social Studies teachers – will soon be at sea assisting NOAA's team with coastal and marine resources conservation and management research.

According to the NOAA website, the Teacher at Sea program provides teachers a clearer insight into our ocean planet, a greater understanding of maritime work and studies, and to increase their level of environmental literacy by fostering an interdisciplinary research experience.

A certified diver, Mr. Allen holds a Masters Degree in History from Florida Atlantic University and has Interdisciplinary Certification in Environmental Studies. Named a finalist in the *individual* category of the 2010 Loggerhead Marinelife Center's "Go Blue Awards for Marine Conservation - Blue Friend of Year" for his many contributions to the environment and his work with students, Mr. Allen also organizes Palm Beach Maritime Academy's annual participation in the Coastal Cleanup and the City Of Lake Worth's Street Painting Festival, and has served as a member of Lake Worth's volunteer citizen Tree Board.

Since 1990, NOAA's Teacher at Sea program has enabled qualified teachers from kindergarten through college to go to sea aboard NOAA research and survey vessels and work side-by-side with scientists, officers, and crew. By gaining such rich, first-hand experience, teachers can then incorporate their new knowledge and experience into classroom curricula, while passing along their enthusiasm and kindling their students' interest in science.

Palm Beach Maritime Academy is a K-8 public charter school located at 7719 South Dixie Highway in West Palm Beach. With a focus on maritime studies, science, and technology, Palm Beach Maritime Academy's curriculum is enhanced with field trips to various maritime and marine sites such as Peanut Island, Loxahatchee Nature Preserve, Pine Jog Education Center, the Port of Palm Beach, and local marinas. Students also learn small boat seamanship and navigation through the use of the Museum vessels.

### Sweetwater Branch Academy Science Olympiad Team Compete in Regional Tournament



Sweetwater Branch Academy (SWBA) Science Olympiad Team competed in the Regional Tournament at Florida Gateway College Saturday, February 26, 2011, and received the 1st place overall among 11 participating teams.

The Science Olympiad competition gives students the opportunity to enhance their scientific and mathematical skills while competing with other students from across the state. Events are designed to test a student's critical thinking and reasoning skills. The top 3 teams in each event were given a medal in the tournament. SWBA received 5 first

place gold medals in Bottle Rocket, Disease Detectives, Ecology, Pentathlon, and Road Scholar, and 3 second place silver medals in Battery Buggy, Picture This, and Storm the Castle in 14 events overall. This is the school's third year attending the Science Olympiad and is the highest place it has finished so far.

# Academy of Arts & Minds Junior, Michael Font, Receives the Gold Key from the Scholastic Writing Awards



Every year the Miami-Dade County Region and The Scholastic Writing Awards invites young individuals to write a creative story and be recognized. Five different types of awards are presented to the students; the Gold Key Award being the highest honor. Five hundred and fifty students submitted a creative story, and only 35 students were presented with the Gold Key Award. Michael Font, a junior at The Academy of Arts & Minds, in the Theater Academy, submitted a story titled "The Accused Mental Persons Who Wait for a Bus" and received a Gold Key Award.

Michael chose to submit his play to the Miami-Dade Region of The Scholastic Writing Award at the suggestion of his teacher, Andrea DeHaan. Font describes his play as being theater of the absurd due to its "cerebral" experience and avant-garde style.

"The Accused Mental Persons Who Wait for a Bus" begins with an elderly man, played by a young girl, and elderly woman, played by a young man, waiting for the bus. Both characters are confused by each other's sense of being and end up questioning each other. As the play progresses, more characters are introduced, including a judge who is the antagonist and a young lady who argues with the elderly woman about love. Michael Font describes his play as not having a plot but, being a "social commentary of generations." Death also lingers around the play and is seen at the end by a beautiful woman. Font hopes to produce "The Accused Mental Person Who Wait for a Bus" at Academy of Arts and Minds and further the play by transforming it into a musical.
