Linda Terranova, Innovation Principal of the Year!



Linda Terranova, Principal of Western Academy Charter School in Royal Palm Beach, Florida, received the 2009 Innovation Principal of the Year Award at the Project CHILD National Conference held in Orlando, Florida on April 18, 2009. This two-day event is hosted annually by the Institute for School Innovation (ISI), and was attended by educators from around the country.

Dr. Sally Butzin, President and Executive Director of ISI, presented the award at a gala awards luncheon held at the Lake Buena Vista Royal Plaza Hotel. Dr. Butzin noted that, "In 2003, Linda was among a group of parents who were distressed about the educational services and programs made available to their children at their local schools, so they opened Western Academy as a Project CHILD school in renovated space in a commerce park facility. Under Linda's leadership the school has continued to arow and expand. Construction is currently underway for a new 13,000 sq. ft. facility which will add more space next school year and allow them to offer the CHILD program to more families in the community."

Western Academy is a full inclusion school that welcomes all children. They have successfully served

students with special needs through Project CHILD and have been continually improving to serve a diverse population of students. They received an "A" grade again last year and look forward to many more successful years ahead.

Project CHILD which stands for "Changing How Instruction for Learning is Delivered" is a unique three-dimensional learning system that incorporates technology and active hands-on learning into daily instruction. Classrooms are organized into cross-grade triad "clusters" using a team-teaching approach. Teachers receive special training to become subject-focused specialists in one of



the core academic areas: reading, writing, or mathematics. Classrooms utilize six different learning stations to incorporate computers, textbooks, and hands-on activities. Teachers work with students for three years to build basic competencies throughout the primary grades (K-2) and intermediate grades (3-5).

The CHILD system was originally developed in 1988 at Florida State University. Numerous research studies over the years have shown that CHILD students have higher test scores, better behavior, and are more involved in learning than are comparable students in traditional classrooms. More information and evaluation data are available on the ISI Web site at <u>www.ifsi.org</u>. Project CHILD is currently being implemented in schools in Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Connecticut, and New York. Nearly 16,000 students are involved.

The Institute for School Innovation (ISI) is a private, non-profit educational organization located in Tallahassee, Florida that was established in 1995 as a vehicle to continue the CHILD research and development, and to promote its growth to reach more students and teachers. The mission of the Institute is to redefine classroom instruction through technology and active learning. ISI engages in research and development, along with professional development, to transform teaching and learning to better meet the educational needs for the 21st century. ISI is the sole source provider of the CHILD instructional system.
